



SALMON WATCH IMPACT

In the last year...

Over 1,200 people participated in field trips, outreach events, and scouting events that highlighted Salmon Watch instruction.

Generously awarded grants provided support to ensure these programs were accessible.

Over 7,300 people accessed our virtual content, incorporating Salmon Watch videos and lessons into their classrooms. These videos were created during school closures and continue to bring the outdoors into homes. Find them on our website for your own enjoyment!

INFO ON TRIPS

Salmon Watch includes: classroom curriculum, an in-person field trip, and a Service Learning Project.

17 field trips at Eagle Creek, Wildwood Recreation Site, Salmon River, Daybreak Park, and Eagle Fern.

These field trips included 3 Latino Network field trips, 13 school field trips, and 1 Girl Scout event.

For our field trips in summer and fall, we served 50% students of color and 45% students enrolled in free/reduced lunch programs.

We will be launching additional field trips in the springtime!







OUR VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY

In 2022, 45 volunteers signed up for Salmon Watch, with more than half of those being brand new to the program!

These volunteers provided 400 hours of instruction to students throughout the summer and fall.

BY THE NUMBERS!

- 50% of our participating students were students of color and 45% were students enrolled in free/reduced lunch programs
- 55% success rate at grants, allowing us to grow Salmon Watch and reach more youths
- 21% increase in social media engagement, with a new emphasis on using Instagram to create new partnerships with similar organizations and recruit new volunteers





STUDENT EDUCATOR PROGRAM

In 2022, our Student Educator (SE) Program expanded! With the hard work of our partner coordinators, we got eight young environmental educators trained and in the field teaching on field trips. Our SE program is dedicated to BIPOC individuals interested in stewardship and education. Our goal is to increase BIPOC peer-mentorship for youth on Salmon Watch field trips. This program helps provide SE professional experience with ecology, education, and leadership. In return, we are able to provide generous stipends for their time and knowledge.
